Program Report

Stefan reported that the evening's speaker would be Kate Haro of Bullseye Turning Supplies, who will explain the process they use to stabilize wood. November will be the toy competition and election of new officers. December 10 will be a bring-your-own meal picnic at the Robbins home. We need presentations for next year.

Questions

The question was asked using the Rockler router table box joint jig. The member is having trouble with the spacing changing as he moves from piece to piece. Others said that wasn't unusual, and the solution is to really crank down on all the locking knobs, so they are truly locked in place.

The question was asked how to make a hexagonal block with a center hole. The answer was to start with a square block a little larger than the final product. Find the center and use a compass to lay out a circle on the blank. Then, without changing the setting on the compass, pick a starting point on the circle and proceed to step around the perimeter. The marks will be approximately one-sixth of the circumference. Connect the points, use the bandsaw to cut off the excess, and drill press to drill the center hole.

Tips

Jeff explained how he uses the blue paper towels sold in auto parts and big box stores to finish his projects. He cuts the towel in half and then folds one half successively until he has a pad about one inch on a side. He then wraps that pad with the other half of the towel to produce a finishing pad. He can refold the outer half to expose new finishing surfaces as needed.

Ed Sheanin suggested using shop-made sanding blocks;



he uses scraps of 2" X 8"s glued together and then bandsaw to shape. The dimensions are 2-3/4" x 7" x 2-1/2" high. The slot on each end is 1/4" wide and 1/2" deep. The 1/4" thick wedges that go in the slots holding the sandpaper in place are slightly tapered lengthwise. He used contact cement to glue the packing rubber (found in the plumbing section of ACE Hardware) onto the bottom. You can use cork instead of rubber if you wish.

This is done by weighing the item{s} and then placing them in an oven at 220° F for 24 hours. The item is then weighed again. The item is returned to the

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oven for four more hours, after which it is weighed again. The process continues in this manner until there is no weight loss. The wood is then placed in a vacuum chamber, where it is covered with resin. A vacuum is then drawn on the chamber and held until bubbles stop emitting from the wood. At this point, the water and air have been removed from the wood and replaced with resin. The resin won't bleed into other wood surfaces. The process will make pine as dense as oak. Dyes can be added to the resin to color the wood. The process works best with less dense woods, such as grape vines. The process can also be used with wood that has become too crumbly to use, such as spalted wood. Her company website is Bullseye Turning Supply.

For the technically curious, the vacuum chambers are acrylic tubes about six inches in diameter and 30 – 60 inches long. The wood is stacked in the chamber to within about six inches of the top, and the resin is two to three inches above the wood. After sealing the top, a vacuum pump, like that used by refrigeration mechanics, is used to pull the vacuum. The pump is lubricated with mineral oil, which is changed after each run. The waste oil is mixed with sawdust and disposed of.

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The first thing I did was read the instructions and check the contents of the kit. The instructions said that there should be 3 strings included, and I only found 2, and the numbers that were supposed to be stamped on the neck to assist in playing were not there. I called the company, and they were very helpful and sent the missing string as well as another complete set. As far as the stamps on the neck were concerned, it turned out there was a whole run of necks missing the stamps. I asked how the numbers were supposed to be laid out and decided that the easiest thing to do was to use my own stamp set.

I have enjoyed working on this kit, and after building the Strumbly, I feel more confident about building a stringed instrument from a plan.

This was my first experience purchasing a kit. If you are looking to expand your woodworking knowledge and want to create something new, a kit may be the way to go.
