#### Safety Talk

Jeff Bremer addressed jointer safety: The minimum size of a board to use on the jointer is 3/8" thick and 12" long. Keep the jointer tables clear and waxed (both for rust protection and to keep the top slippery. Never use it with the blade guard removed. Always Use appropriate push sticks — it is better to take several small cuts than one deep cut. Orient the grain



downhill towards the table, which will result in a smoother cut and less resistance, and less tear out.

Walk your work along the tables, don't stretch and lean over to finish your cut. Always try to keep a push block over the region of the blades, but do not overly press down — keep the pressure even.

Generally, keep the cup or bowed side of the board down against the table or fence. If there are any spots or regions

that are significantly high, use a hand plane to take the high spots off first.

After flattening the bottom of one side, use that side against the fence for edge joining. When edge joining, keep your hands above the fence if possible. If you have a magnetic featherboard, that can be helpful when edge jointing.

#### Q&A

Gary Hirsch asked how to keep spindle sander drums tight. One suggestion was to turn the nut down harder with pliers. Another person suggested cleaning the rubber drum with (real) mineral spirits before putting the drum on. Another person suggested adding a layer of electrical tape or hockey stick tape on the drum.

#### Tips & Tricks

Mark Collins said that a nice finishing touch on a project is to "clock" your screws. Clocking screws means lining up the slots so they are identical.

Steve Sampietro said that golf tees are good if you need to fill screw holes. Gary added that pencil sharpeners are good when you want to match wood species.

Eitan Ginsburg said that when installing brass hinges, you can use the same size of steel screws first, then after the box



is completely done, replace the steel screws with brass ones at the very end.

Steve Veenstra said gunsmithing screwdrivers are very good for small screws.

Chuck Nickerson said Grace USA sells a very nice quality screwdriver.

Jonathan Nail said that a light application of paraffin wax on the sole of a plane helps reduce friction. Tom Ferkel puts



Steve Veenstra showed two bowls he made with resin and Macassar Ebony. He also showed an octagonal box he made from padauk.

Steve Sampietro showed two teaching aids he made. One has red and green disks for Stop & Go. He used space balls inside each end to keep it from clacking loudly. The second teaching aid he uses to engage

students has a whiteboard rotary panel inside a frame to write questions on. As it rotates, there are detents that catch it to stop rotating at the right location.

Calvin Sov showed a cherry fork and purpleheart spatula that he hand-carved. They were wet-sanded using 3000 and 8000-grit sandpaper with BLO (boiled linseed oil). He explained that the sawdust-BLO slurry cures in the pores of the wood and results in

a very smooth finish. He also showed several inspirational

books that he purchased during a recent trip.

Mark Collins showed a knife block that he had made. It has a curved body on three sides and was made from bubinga and finished in BLO, shellac, and spray pre-catalyzed lacquer. Chuck Nickerson explained that BLO (Boiled Linseed Oil)

brings out the chatoyance in the wood. This effect depends on the molecular weight of the finish. Polyurethane has a very high molecular weight, around 2500. BLO is around 500 or



20% of that, so it allows more reflective light. Tung oil also has a very molecular weight. Jeff Bremer said that he sands to 320 and then wet sands BLO using 2000 grit sandpaper.

Chuck noted that Brian Miller is teaching a great class on finishing at Cerritos College.

#### Presentation

Mike Wells did a presentation on blacksmithing in the school shop adjacent to the wood shop. He showed the setup and use of the forge and blower (he uses coal). He suggested that someone wanting to do blacksmithing at home purchase a propane forge, which is not very expensive, has a small footprint, and is cleaner and easier to manage than a coal forge. He demonstrated forging a square nail from a bar of steel, drawing it out, tapering the body, and shaping the head.
