
Q&A

Mike Wells asked about router profiles that might

match a 1920s mission-style house window ledge he is helping a friend restore. One suggestion was to use router bits to get the profile close, then finish with either sandpaper backed



by shaped foam, hollows & rounds; or scratch stock. Suggestions on matching the existing chestnut lumber included using redwood or beech and then touching it up to match the grain.



Luke Wyatt asked about sharpening jointer blades. Several suggested that you can eliminate a nick in the blades by shifting one of the blades horizontally.

Stefan showed two (bespoke) fountain pens he had made and explained how the fine threading is done in cast resin


(the threads are so fine that they would not survive in the pen's wooden body).

Chuck Nickerson showed a screw clamp he modified to accept removable inner jaws. The metal parts are available at Lee Valley.

Greg Golden showed a router trammel he



purchased many years ago that attaches to the router base. It uses a 1/8" pin as the center point for cutting holes or See "Minutes" on page 3

Jack Robbins showed a box he made to hold a wedding cake cutter and server. These are engraved with each couple in the family that gets married. The box was made from walnut, ebony, and lacewood. The box itself has a lacquer finish. Luke Wyatt

box he had made recently from walnut, oak, and maple. The mechanism came from "Music Box Attic" in Canoga Park. He also showed a prototype of a mid-century mod-

ern-style chair he is working on.

miter slot in the table saw rather than riding against the fence, and he added a stop to the system, so that consistency is, well, consistent.

Mark Collins showed a carrier and platform he made for his WorkSharp sharpening system. It uses CBN wheels (CBN is the second-hardest material, after diamond, and has the benefit of dissipating heat during grinding). He made it with adjustable feet and added an adjustable Tormek support bar that allows him to use

The Club met on Oct. 21 and 22 at El Camino Real Charter High School in Woodland Hills. We were very fortunate to once again have access to the 5,000 square foot workshop with its more than adequate workbenches and its plethora of large-scale power tools. Though we did not use the power tools for our assembly process, the workbench space was a great asset. We put 12+ eager members to work for two days, as we assembled and boxed 1500+ handmade toys for needy children.

SFVW member Don Schuster pointed out that a fitting "thank you" to the Shop would be a contribution to its scholarship fund. Since the passing of former shop teacher Bob Ganssle in 2012, the staff and administration established the "Ganssle Award" Scholarship Fund in Spring 2013. Every June, the Fund awards the two best woodworking students with cash scholarships so that they can pursue the craft.

I spoke briefly with Jacob Friedberg, the current woodshop instructor. He was most happy to help us out, and equally happy that we are interested in the Ganssle program. Friedberg remarked that this school's PSTA was dissolved recently and as such, that group no longer funds half the Ganssle award. Thus, any help we can give to their scholarship program will be appreciated.

their jigs on the WorkSharp.

Ron Sabatino showed a display box he made for a glass ball made from walnut and edge-grain wenge. He pointed out that he measured and measured, but the box was 1/8''too short. But that was because when he measured, he didn't account for the recessed lid. It was easily corrected, and his mistake was a good





reminder for the rest of us.

Emily Lichtman displayed a wood mosaic painting made with walnut diamonds showing a tumbling block pattern. These were arranged over a gold resin background and mounted on plywood. She stained some of the walnut diamonds to develop a three-dimensional effect.



Sammy Azaren showed a set of three nesting oval Shaker boxes he made at the Community Workshop in Glendale. The boxes are made from very thin strips of cherry, steam bent to make the oval form, and secured with copper rivets.
