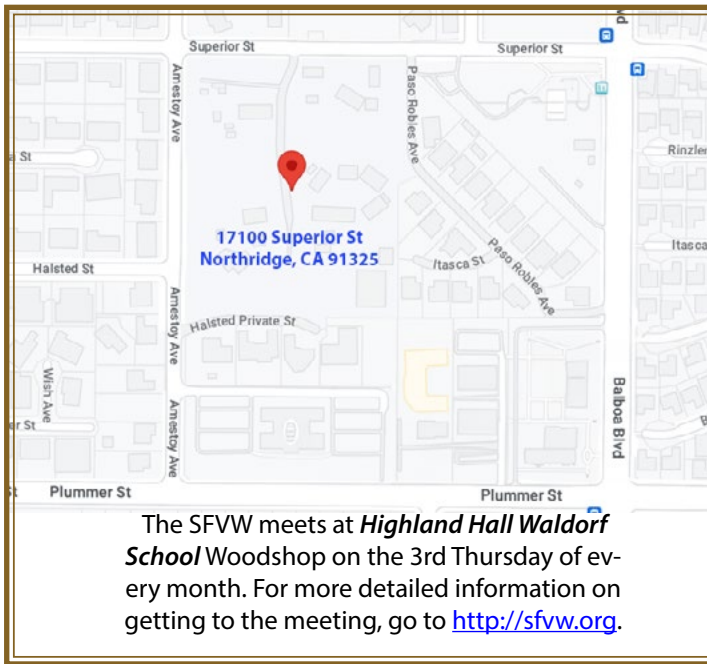

Lifting heavy Equipment — by yourself

In December, I treated myself and upgraded my dust collector: I purchased the Harvey G700. (Jeff Bremer has one, and loves it.) I love it as well, but the G700 had one issue that I needed to deal with: the casters.

The G700 has three casters: two are fixed and one pivots. So, if you want to move it sideways, you have to go back and forth at an angle. In my shop, that's not easy.

I purchased two pivoting casters (\$26), but you can't just replace them. This is because the casters sit within the "U" structure of the frame and there's not enough space for the pivoting casters to rotate. The solution was obvious; I needed to put a spacer in between the frame and the caster to provide the space that the caster needed to rotate.

To know how thick a spacer, I made a mock-up of the "U" shape of the frame. This let me determine that I needed a 3/4" spacer.

That could have been a lot of washers. I also considered using metal tubes. But I settled on wood. Then I had a choice to make: oak or hard maple! Turns out that white oak has a Janka rating of 1350 while hard maple's rating is 1450. Hard maple it would be.

But now, I had to lift a 400 pound machine off the ground to access the wheels. An engine block lifter or a forklift would have made quick work of all this but I have neither. Then, one morning, about 5 AM, I woke up mulling on this and then thought about those air bags that rescue folks use to lift cars off of people. It turns out that THOSE bags

are very expensive. But, you can get smaller ones that can lift up to 500 pounds for around \$22. I bought the AirshimPro from Amazon (<http://tinyurl.com/4tjsusjx>).



While waiting for this lifting bag to arrive, I prepared my spaces and cut some scrap wood, 1/2" & 3/4" thick, up into 9" long

pieces to place under the dust collector as I raised it up.

When the ShimPro came in, I tried it out. After a couple of pumps, I was lifting the side of the G700.

It took me about 1.5 hours to get it about 7.5 inches off the ground (it's a tedious process by yourself). The process is slow: you have to lift one side high enough to get some boards underneath, then go to the other side, then go back to the first side. Realistically, you can best raise something this heavy up about 1/2" – 3/4" at a time. Nonetheless, I lifted a 400 pound machine by myself — safely!


